Info: 626 405 2100 This traveling exhibition pairs for the first time approximately 150 works by American photographers Paul Caponigro (b. 1932) and Bruce Davidson (b. 1933), enlightened observers of Britain and Ireland in the 1960s and '70s. For Caponigro, Ireland and Britain became sites of creative energy to which he returned repeatedly. Davidson brought the same gritty street sensibility that had made his Brooklyn Gang series a sensation among photograph collectors. The exhibition examines the artistic, social, and historical forces informing two master photographers as they bring American eyes to enduring landscapes and changing cultural scenes.

If you have an interest in the Irish involvement in World War I the link below may be of benefit, It is a free online World War I exhibition titled "It's a long way to Tipperary: An Irish story of the great war". This project follows the lives of a single family throughout the Great War to illustrate the social, physical and emotional impact of the conflict at an individual level and the irrevocable personal, cultural and societal changes wrought by the war. It is based on the diaries, correspondence, photographs and memorabilia accumulated by the Armstrong family of Moyaliffe Castle, County Tipperary, between 1914 and 1918. Hit the 'follow' button on the bottom right hand of the page (it's is totally free-just needs an e mail from you and on receiving your confirmation, it will send you the weekly updates) The weekly posts consist of extracts from diaries and correspondence created and collected by the Armstrong family during the war years. A native American tribal leader, who now lives in the <u>Donegal</u> Gaeltacht, says he feels a connection to the spirit of the land around Mount Errigal and that living in Ireland has healed him. Gary Issi-Tohibi – or White Deer – says he has been 'invited' to Ireland 17 times. The 63-year-old <u>Choctaw Nation</u> professor has lived in <u>Donegal</u> for only four months, but told the Irish Independent that he has found 'home.'

"We believe that you carry a piece of your home with you wherever you go so that is with me today, here in Donegal. It is a very easy place to feel the spirit of the land. There is a great sense of place here, the spirit of the land is very much here," he said.

White Deer resides in a small cottage in the townland of Cashel na gCorr, near Gortahork and overlooking Mount Errigal. According to the Irish Independent, he is learning Irish phrases and spends his days painting in the Donegal countryside and working on a novel that looks at the modern day tribe.

In 1847, his tribe, the Choctaw, sent \$117 to Ireland after learning about the <u>Great Famine</u>. The Choctaw lost thousands of its people when it was forced to relocate from Mississippi to Oklahoma in 1831 in what became known as the Trail of Tears.

Friday. 6th February. Professor Sofia Gruskin, director of the <u>Program on Global Health & Human Rights</u> at the University of Southern California <u>Institute for Global Health</u> has been invited to serve as a keynote speaker under President Michael D. Higgins <u>President's Ethics Initiative</u>. The event will be held at the National University of Ireland in Galway and is entitled "<u>The Human Right to Health</u>". With collaboration from the Irish Centre for Human Rights and the College of Medicine, Nursing and Health Sciences at NUI Galway, the event will take place on February 6th. In the presence of President Higgins, the meeting is structured to examine how a human rights framework can be useful in the Irish context to inform ethical means to improve the health and wellbeing of all and deliver healthcare fairly.

President Higgins will open the event and then introduce Professor Gruskin's presentation, which will identify and discuss the complex interactions between health and human rights, with particular emphasis on the use of human rights norms and standards for public health thinking and practice. With reference to the links between ethics and rights, frameworks for analyzing the interactions between health and human rights will be introduced including: the effects of health, law, policies and programs on human rights; health consequences of human rights violations; and the linkages between promoting and protecting health and promoting and protecting human rights.

Health topics including HIV, sexual and reproductive health, non-communicable disase, child and adolescent health and health systems strengthening will be used to illustrate and explore practical applications of human rights to public health. With attention to the linkages between the right to health and other rights, a rights-based approach to health will be introduced with implications for accountability, advocacy, policy and service delivery. The keynote will be followed by a series of presentations by leaders from around Ireland who work on these issues including the Chief Commissioner of the Northern Ireland Human Rights Commission as well as George Ulrich, professor at the Riga Graduate School of Law in Latvia.

This is a historic event and one that we hope will result in significant collaboration and be of use to the people of Ireland. Participants can register to attend for free at http://www.conference.ie
