

IN LOVING MEMORY OF DOUGLAS H. DEEMS JOIN US IN HIS FIGHT AGAINST MULTIPLE MYELOMA

Our beloved Doug passed away on May 14, 2020. His bout with cancer was guided by the brilliance and kindness of Dr. Stephen J. Forman, and City of Hope Comprehensive Cancer Center in Los Angeles. Doug's final wish was that donations made in his name go to support <u>Dr. Forman's Immunotherapy</u> <u>Research Program</u> for the treatment of Multiple Myeloma, the disease which took his life.

Multiple myeloma is the second most common blood cancer diagnosis. It is estimated that 12,830 deaths from this disease will occur this year. Dr. Forman's active research program at City of Hope is on the verge of developing an immunotherapy treatment for patients suffering as Doug did. My Dad was a lifelong Angeleno.

He was an altar boy at Our Lady of Peace in Sepulveda, a Saint Genevieve's High School "Valiant."

Dad and Mom met at Saint Gen's when they were 14, and were not to meet again until the late 80s. He was voted "most likely to succeed" by his fellow students as a senior and carried the title only about a thirty minute drive to Occidental College ("Oxy") the following year.

At Oxy, Dad played football and studied economics - and reveled in the pranks of his older brother Dan and his fraternity. Dad was a prankster, too. As the youngest of six, he was the family's memory and comic relief-ventriloquist: constantly regaling us with stories from the past with the same enthusiasm that he performed Nixon and Daffy Duck impersonations since the age of 8.

During his Junior Year at Oxy, Dad studied for a semester at American University in DC.

After Oxy, Dad went on to pursue law at UC Hastings where, just as he had at every other stage of his life, he made lifelong friendships. That was Dad: he was a nexus between people, generating the energy and life of the party that suffused rooms full of strangers with the sense that they had known each other for years. He had a memory like the stratum of soil that preserves a pristine archeological site, each layer with its own significance and texture.

After Law School, Dad re-met Mom. A loving 33 year relationship marked by three children, seven dogs, two rabbits, one cat, and an open-door policy towards goldfish. Dad practiced Law and accumulated an even greater network of friends during his time at Peterson Ross, Pillsbury Madison & Sutro, and Arthur Andersen. Collaborating with some of his colleagues from Arthur Andersen, Dad went on to be a cofounder of The Claro Group in 2005.

Dad loved the Dodgers and didn't miss opening day for 33 years, accompanied by the same group of boys. My sister Maeve said, "He was an amazing father: he never let the Myeloma get him down. He went to every Dodger game, even in the worst shape—a true Angeleno." He always went to spring training in Arizona and claimed to know the best shortcuts through Elysian Park.

Though the Dodgers were his team, he developed a love for Hockey during the Kings' heyday as Stanley Cup victors in 2012. He was a season ticket holder at both the Staples Center and Dodger Stadium, always excited to bring us along for the ride.

Dad's battle with cancer was progressive, but he never seemed sick nor was he willing to allow his diagnosis to alter his life. For nearly five years, he drove himself to treatment, worked, played poker with his friends, brought his children to Kings and Dodger games, traveled, carved the turkey on Thanksgiving, collected wine, edited our papers, ate blocks of cheddar by the light of the TV, celebrated birthdays, cried at graduations, and was always Dad. He was diagnosed May 1st, 2015 and passed away in the midst of family almost exactly five years later.

We will miss Dad for his kindness, his sense of humor, his perfect words.



Paddy Noonan, for years one of the most popular figures on the Irish American entertainment scene has died after a long illness aged 83.


Noonan's passing was announced by his daughter, Sheila Noonan Gorham. Ground Talsh

The Mallow, County Cork native was a New York City resident for most of his life but his musical work saw him criss-cross the United States. He was a star attraction on many Irish American ship cruises.

Sheila Noonan Gorham announced in a facebook posting: "It is with a heavy heart that I announce, after a long illness, the passing of our father Paddy Noonan.

"As his passing happens at such a strange and difficult time, and we will be unable to gather to send him off with the fanfare he so deserves....the music and song, the laughter and sharing of memories and stories of old, the held hands and warm, healing hugs, I wanted to take just a few moments of your time to share my thoughts on a man, a father, a friend and a life so beautifully lived."

Noonan, who is survived by his wife Margaret, three daughters and five grandchildren, would have celebrated his 84th birthday on May 5.

When I was a young and handsome lad I was grabbed and whirled by tipsy Irish women when the cassette tape in the Panasonic played "Wild Rover" and "Wild Colonial Boy" in a wallpapered room in West London carpeted with men and women who believed in hard work, family, Catholic mass, and justice; and I learned about being a man by accepting kisses on the cheek at the end of the night from women named Bridie and Bernie and Kay; by listening to the spirit that ran through conversations flowing over and around each other to the pop of cans of McEwan's pale ale opening like hundreds of small explosions, and to the clink of glasses filled with Babycham, Jameson, or Johnnie Walker; by travelling back to an earlier time when the room went quiet and John Galvan sang "The Banks of My Own Lovely Lee" in an untrained yet tender tenor; by understanding sixty years after 1916, four years after Bloody Sunday. and only weeks after pub bombings in Guildford and Birmingham, that our little dining room, beside our little kitchen, was home this Saturday night to men who cut sheet-metal and paved driveways. and women who raised families on not much more than perseverance and selflessness; was Church for the singing of patriotic songs of freedom, loss, and pain; was a kind of heaven, where my generation first prayed theirs would one day find a way to let ao... of the prejudices, grudges, and resentments the hardest among them clung to, on both sides of the Isle, so we can build peace and live in harmony...

so we can all be free.

The Best Present Ever: A Sinner's Guide to the Holy Land

I didn't want to go on a pilgrimage to the Holy Land because I thought it would be hot and dry and boring, and I'd have to drag around on someone else's schedule with a group of serious religious types looking at one ancient shrine after another. *No, thanks*. This is what I told my wife every time she asked me to go with her and her parents. Then, a week before Christmas, in my usual state of panic over what to get her, I signed up, put the receipt in a box, and gave her the gift of myself.

Two months later, we joined a Dutch couple who owned a Catholic gift shop; a soft-spoken priest devoted to Mary, who had never been to the Holy Land before; some Americans; an opinionated teacher and her photog husband; two young Brazilians learning to be tour guides; and thirty Filipinos oblivious to the shopaholic stereotype, for a once-in-a-lifetime experience.

Decidedly non-preachy, *The Best Present Ever: A Sinner's Guide to the Holy Land*, lays bare the narrator's unfiltered thoughts and observations as the days and nights unfold. Readers experience the constant hawkers; an argument at the Shrine of the Nativity involving a Russian tour guide; a night-time lovers tiptoe across the rooftops of old Jerusalem; a disastrous three minutes at the Tomb of Jesus; a pilgrimage-ending confession described by the tour group priest as "a good one"; and an impromptu sojourn through the poverty-stricken Muslim District of Jerusalem that the narrator will never forget. The bus driver is Muslim, the tour guide is seriously Catholic, and the story is universal... *how do we all get along?*

Sticking to Budget Can Boost Your Emergency Fund Article 9 – June 1, 2020

During the coronavirus pandemic, our health concerns – for ourselves and our loved ones – have been at the top of our minds. But financial worries have been there, too, both for people whose employment has been affected and for investors anxious about the volatile financial markets. And one aspect of every individual's total financial picture has become quite clear – the importance of an emergency fund.

Even in normal times, it's a good idea for you to keep three to six months' worth of living expenses in a liquid, low-risk account. Having an emergency fund available can help you cope with those large, unexpected costs, such as a major car repair or a costly medical bill.

Furthermore, if you have an adequate emergency fund, you won't have to dip into your long-term investments to pay for short-term needs. These investment vehicles, such as your IRA and 401(k), are designed for your retirement, so the more you can leave them intact, the more assets you're likely to have when you retire. And because they are intended for your retirement, they typically come with disincentives, including taxes and penalties, if you do tap into them early. (However, as part of the economic stimulus legislation known as the CARES Act, individuals can now take up to \$100,000 from their 401(k) plans and IRAs without paying the 10% penalty that typically applies to investors younger than 59½. If you take this type of withdrawal, you have up to three years to pay the taxes and, if you want, replace the funds, beyond the usual caps on annual contributions.

Of course, life is expensive, so it's not always easy to put away money in a fund that you aren't going to use for your normal cash flow. That's why it's so important to establish a budget and stick to it. When developing such a budget, you may find ways to cut down on your spending, freeing up money that could be used to build your emergency fund.

There are different ways to establish a budget, but they all typically involve identifying your income and expenses and separating your needs and wants. You can find various online budgeting tools to help you get started, but, ultimately, it's up to you to make your budget work. Nonetheless, you may be pleasantly surprised at how painless it is to follow a budget. For example, if you've budgeted a certain amount for food each month, you'll need to avoid going to the grocery store several times a week, just to pick up "a few things" – because it doesn't really take that many visits for those few things to add up to hundreds of dollars. You'll be much better off limiting your trips to the grocery, making a list of the items you'll need and adhering to these lists. After doing this for a few months, see how much you've saved – it may be much more than you'd expect. Besides using these savings to strengthen your emergency fund, you could also deploy them toward longer-term investments designed to help you reach other objectives, such as retirement.

Saving money is always a good idea, and when you use your savings to build an emergency fund, you can help yourself prepare for the unexpected and make progress toward your long-term goals.
